Current News

City Plans for Sauk Creek Greenway & Restoration—we need you to participate!

City engineering staff JoJo O'Brien and others held their first public informational meeting on this project, slated to begin in 2020, at the Ashman Library on Tues., March 13th.

This mile-long restoration project, consisting of 27 acres, runs from Tree Lane to Old Sauk Road and behind the western border of Tamarack, specifically Cedar Creek and Oak Creek and northward on the edge of Walnut Grove Park. City plans are to improve the greenway so as it acts as originally designed-- reduce area flooding and carry water off to Lake Mendota, remove invasive trees and undergrowth, provide safer access. The most contentious issue seemed to be plans for developed foot and bike paths that most residents were not aware the area was approved for a bike path in a city plan back in 2015.

Finance Committee News

The Finance Committee met at the end of February and reviewed the end of year financial report. It was determined that we ended that year with a cash surplus of just over \$20,000. We also reviewed the payroll portion of the budget, in particular the SIMPLE IRA we offer to our staff as one of their benefits after a year of employment at TT. Tamarack matches staff contributions to their IRA up to 3% of their gross salary.

Before it's time to work on the 2019 budget, the committee will spend a significant amount of time learning how monthly assessments are calculated as well as the components of our 30-year budget. It is important that more than one or two people understand how our financial records are maintained.

Seasonal Reminders & Projects

Grounds Update

Lori and I met with Maple Leaf staff to introduce ourselves and talk about the snow issues that have been brought to our attention.

Should there be another snow event, Maple Leaf will start with homes on Tree Lane and then move to Oak Creek. We talked about the cul-de-sac on Oak Creek (28-44) that was missed in the past. The staff indicated they would make sure to get the main drive plowed so there aren't problems getting out. The main equipment used for the first round of snow plowing is not able to maneuver in the small space of 28-44 without damage it has to be completed by bobcats after the main plow of Oak Creek.

The Maple Leaf staff and TT staff ask that you please leave the snow stakes in the ground until moved by staff. If we get another snow event and they are moved, there is a better chance for damage. Thanks for your patience with this.

The TT landscape crew is going around taking pictures and measurements of rock walls before plant material starts going. We are also grading the structure.

The landscape crew has been busy with dormant pruning and is finishing up Phase 2 and will be moving to Phase 3 shortly.

The arborist is making his way through the property taking down Ash trees that weren't treated. He is also taking care of some of the pruning. We are filling the holes of the trees that were taken out. Grading and seeding will be done later. We are filling for safety.

When temperatures warm up and there is no chance for snow, we will begin fixing turf damage.

This month we are continuing working on decks in Cedar Creek and Tree Lane, installing a new split rail fence by the garden on the Tree Lane, as well as continuing trim replacement and other projects as they arise. We are also shooting for an April 16th date for opening the tennis court, weather dependent.

This is the time of year for foundation leaks, keep an eye on your basement. Let maintenance know if you find any moisture. Also, if you have heat tapes, they can be unplugged in the next few weeks

Know Your Neighbor – Larry Wolfinger

This month I had the pleasure of interviewing and getting to know Larry Wolfinger of 7333 Tree Lane. Now it is my turn to introduce him to all of you.

Larry's family, as with many of our families, represents the American Dream. Great, great grandparents from Wafenstein, Bavaria (a town no longer shown on a German map) came to America and became sharecroppers around Lancaster, OH (close to Columbus, OH). The next generation owned their own farm, and then the next generation, Larry's parents, Bernard & Vera Matz Wolfinger, migrated up to

Michigan to better their lot, & to work in the General Motors plant. At the same time, this generation encouraged education for their five children.

Larry grew up in Lansing, MI, and graduated from Lansing Everett H.S., the same H.S. that Magic Johnson attended. Larry's outside activities in H.S. were basketball & water polo. He attended college at Lansing Community College & also took classes at Michigan State. He is a big Michigan State fan, and he was even wearing a coat and shirt proclaiming his loyalty when he came to my condo for the interview!! His major was Computer Science, the field that he has worked in since graduation, and the field that has also attracted a brother & Larry's twin sister.

He had been divorced for many years, and has no children.

Larry has had a variety of work experiences, and he loves working. He has no plans to retire, but rather says he will work part-time or full-time for as long as he possibly can. He has chosen to move around because he says that he has made a pact with himself years ago that he would never stay in a job he didn't like.

He worked for the Pollock Company in Lansing, MI; the State of Michigan; the Menomonee Indian tribe; Lands End in Dodgeville, and currently for the Star of Wisconsin Investment Board, but he says that his work for the Indian Tribe taught him the most of any of the jobs. Larry and another white, middle class man were hired for two years, much to the consternation of many tribal members, to update their computer system. Many in the tribe had to be won over to the idea that this was something that "outsiders" needed to do because in the past all jobs had been held by tribal members. As well as installing this newer system. Larry and his boss had to train tribal members to take over after two years, as well as deal with animosity, & build trust. Quite a large order!!

Larry has lived in Tamarack for almost six years, first as a renter, and then as an owner of a "fixer upper" condo. He liked the "fixer upper" part because he is handy as the woodworking shop in his garage will attest to. He likes Tamarack because he says we have a sense of community and a pride in our community, and he also likes the diversity, & intelligence of the residents. He says that we live in the middle of a city that doesn't always have stability, but Tamarack has stability. A neighbor urged him to serve on the Tamarack Board which he did for two years, but he found that he was not able to do the job he wanted to do because he still works full time; therefore, he is now off the board with plans to someday return. His neighbor saw in him a person who can "change things quietly for the better."

Travel is very important to Larry, and he told me of two trips planned for the future. One in early September to Mexico (Cabul San Lucas), and one in November to Las Vegas to visit a cousin and watch Michigan State play in a tournament. He also likes to go back to Michigan a couple of times/year to visit relatives.

I asked Larry if anything unusual had happened to him since he moved into Tamarack, and he recalled one incident. It seems there was an empty unit close to him, and one night a neighbor called to say a light kept going on over there, under the deck. She wondered if someone was trying to break into the unit or worse yet, were already in the unit. Larry investigated. It seems there was an outdoor sensor light under the deck, and a bird was building a nest on top of it, & each time the bird flew around it, the light was triggered to go on. Larry tore down the nest and the problem was solved.

It sure is nice that younger residents like Larry Wolfinger are living in Tamarack to carry on in the years to come.

Calling All Gardeners for 2018 Think Spring Planting

Think beyond snow and mud, but of seeds, seedlings, trowels, hoes, and garden bounty. This year as usual, the gardens will be roto-tilled, plots staked, and assigned as soon as the weather and ground moisture permit.

The Garden Committee will attempt to accommodate returning gardeners in the same location as last year, if they choose. Plot sizes may be reduced if the demand is greater than the number of plots available.

ALL APPLICATIONS AND FEES MUST BE RETURNED BY: **Tuesday, April 17, 2018.**

Your fees cover the cost of roto-tilling, fall plowing, supplies, repairs, and water. Assigned plots will be posted on the garden shed sometime in late April or early May.

Make your check payable to **TAMARACK TRAILS (memo—2017 garden plot)** in the total amount that represents the size plot that you desire.

There are additional fees for Non-Residents and No-till plots; both add-ons may apply. If you want bales of straw or compost, you will need to buy or bring your own.

Gardens will be assigned and staked soon after spring plowing; gardens must be cleanup per the policy by October 31 (Nov. 30 for no-till plots).

Please note FEES:

*Non-Resident Fees are 25% more than Tamarack Resident Fees.

**No-Till Fees are 25% more than regular garden plots (and where applicable, the Non-Resident Fee may also apply).
