Christmas Tree Disposal

Time to take down the tree. Tamarack staff will be collecting your "naked" tree through January 31st.

- Remove all tree stands, regardless of if they are metal or wood.
- Remove all tree decorations such as lights, ornaments, or other metal objects.
- Remove any tree bags, and any other foreign object.

What about wreaths?

Do not place wreaths, evergreen rope, garlands, and boughs out for tree collection. These belong in the trash. They contain wires or metal that can damage wood chipping equipment.

What About Those Assessments?

You recently received notice of your 2024 Annual Monthly Assessment (AMA) and you may be wondering, "Why the big increase?" On behalf of the Board of Directors, this article will explain why the AMA is necessary, how it's calculated and what's different this year.

Background: Here at Tamarack Trails, about 70% of AMA money is used to pay for annual operating expenses such as staff wages and benefits, snow removal, lawn care, minor repairs and maintenance, etc. The remaining 30% is kept in a reserve account to pay expenses that don't occur every year such as replacement of roofs, siding, asphalt, sewer lines, pool, etc. Some housing associations ignore the second part and impose special assessments, as needed, to pay for large projects. By planning ahead, Tamarack seeks to eliminate worry about sudden, large assessments and ensure generational equity. In some years more money is taken out of the reserve account than goes in and in other years it's the reverse. Tamarack's goal over the long term is to have money available in the reserve account when it's needed.

Principles: The calculations that make up your AMA are complex, but the principles are not. Tamarack costs are broken into several categories and costs in each category are assigned to individual units based on each unit's characteristics.

- All units have a roof and siding, so those costs are split up based on the square footage of each unit's roof and siding.
- The costs of decks and patios are assessed only to units that have decks and patios. Units with bigger decks and patios pay higher costs.
- Costs for common facilities (pool, clubhouse, racquet courts, walking paths, fences, signs, and maintenance buildings) are assigned to all units equally.
- Tamarack dwelling insurance covers replacement costs for all 320 living units. Insurance premiums are allocated to units based on estimated replacement costs for each unit.
- Grounds maintenance and asphalt replacement are calculated separately for each of Tamarack's seven phases of development. Some phases are more densely built up than others. More density means less grounds maintenance and asphalt replacement per unit.

What's new this year: The *average* AMA increased \$42.62 per month or 10% in 2024. Individual increases ranged from \$41 to \$47 and percentage increases ranged from 8.1% to 11.8%. About half of the AMA increase is due to higher operating expenses and the other half is related to the reserve fund. The operating expenses were driven by increased labor costs, the need for additional professional services and higher material costs. The reserve portion of the increase was required to ensure sufficient funds to meet our long-term needs while absorbing unexpected costs of replacing the pool and repairing wood rot without a loan or special assessment.

Board and Committee Business

Board Meeting Notes – December 19, 2023

This is an informal report about the regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors. The official minutes will be posted on the Tamarack website after approval by the Board.

All Directors and Association Manager Stacey Haberman were present. Thirty residents also attended in person and by Zoom.

Stacey reported on several items. Major points:

- Richard started on December 14 as a full-time Maintenance Technician. Tamarack is now fully staffed.
- The clubhouse has three furnaces and the 23-year-old unit that heats the upstairs stopped working. Repairs would be expensive with no guarantee that other problems wouldn't arise later. With no time to explore alternative options, the Board approved the purchase of a new furnace to be installed as soon as possible. [Installation was completed 12/26/23.]
- Rollie and Julio completed "confined spaces" training.

New officers were approved for the Resident Activities Committee:

- Co-Chairs: Lynnie Clemens and Bev Mazur
- Secretary: Diane Jungblut
- Treasurer: Janice Gratsch

Lynn Waishwell will present a Tam Talk about her snorkeling adventure in Indonesia. The talk will take place at 6:30 PM on January 16, 2024.

James Steinbach and Ginny White were approved to represent the Board on the Human Resources Committee.

The ad hoc Communications Committee recommended and the Board approved a down payment to Nate at WildDesigns for initial reconstruction of Tamarack's website. He will revise the home page and resident portal login page, update links, add up-to-date documents and fix broken links and other noted problems. Work will begin in January.

The Board approved asking each standing committee to refer one of its members to serve on the 50th Anniversary planning committee.

Some residents raised concerns about possible replacement of the swimming pool with a lesser design, e.g., smaller surface area and/or reduced depth. They thought the content, timing and methodology of the pool survey were inadequate, and suggested design and financing ideas for consideration. The Board emphasized that the survey was just a first step toward finding out what residents think about possible pool designs and costs. Meetings will be scheduled soon to discuss pool replacement in more detail.
