Board and Committee Business

Board Meeting Notes - September 24, 2024

This is an informal report about the regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors. The official minutes will be posted on the Tamarack website after approval by the Board. Board members Steinbach, Jesien, Larson, White, Foley, Meyer, and Association Manager Haberman, and 10 residents were present. Findley and 15 residents attended Zoom.

The Association Manager reported on work in progress: Swimming pool

- Concrete pours are complete, wave line is currently being installed
- Removal of pool decking will start soon
- Tile colors selected for the pool by community are in clubhouse lobby for viewing Maintenance
- Replacing entire rim joist and sill plate on a foundation (2 homes)
- Removing and replacing damaged light posts / electrical wire replacing
- Replacing ground breaker on foundations
- Deck repairs
- Gutter maintenance, cleaning, and repairs
- Trim repair and replacement
- Minor roof repairs
- Working with contractors on concrete replacements
- Working with contractor on asphalt replacements
- Working with Badger on Pool
- Basic plumbing repairs/work orders
- Power washing

August 2024 financial statements weren't available. The August 31 balance at US Bank was \$629,000, an increase of \$13,000. The Edward Jones balance was \$602,700, an increase of \$1,600.

The 2025 budget hearing will be held October 10th. The draft budget represents an overall 5.3% increase in AMA.

The Board of Directors will seek resident input on:

- Appropriate cost division when owners choose to upgrade to composite materials for deck replacement.
- Reconstitution of Ad Hoc Solar Committee as Ad Hoc Energy Conservation and Green Energy Committee.
- Proposed financing for club house solar panels.

The Amenities Committee meets on an as needed basis, but that doesn't stop them from getting things done! As of our last Good Life article we've met with the Budget committee on proposals for the 2025 budget and making planned expenditures already budgeted for 2024. Updates from the Architectural Review Board

Window Replacement Procedures

Our units are aging! If you find you need to replace windows in your unit, make sure you follow the procedures stated in the Book of Standards, which can be found on the Tamarack Trails website: https://www.tamaracktrails.com/info/.

Tamarack Trails now requiring full frame window replacements which opens the entire window frame providing for an adequate inspection. This results in the replacement of any rotted framing materials and adequately seals the new window to the elements, leaving you with near worry-free installations. You are encouraged to work with bidders or contractors and share window/door replacement specifications as included in the Book of Standards. All unit owners should contact the Office when considering window/door replacements. Having staff inspect installations adds value to your unit; they can determine if any water intrusion or wood rot has taken place requiring repair or replacement.

Post Lights and Miniature White Lights

You may see your post light coming on earlier and staying on longer now that the season has changed. ALWAYS leave the interior switch for your post light ON (even if you are away). The post light fixtures have a motion sensor which triggers the on/off mode. There are switch cover

guards that one can install on the interior switch, so family members or visitors don't mistakenly turn off this switch.

Homeowners may install miniature, non-twinkling, white lights from October 25th to March 15th for safety and security purposes. These lights must be removed, not simply turned off, by March 15th to facilitate pruning. The white lights may adorn shrubs, fences, and light posts on the owner's unit lot. Extension cords must be marked and protected so that letter carriers, snow shovelers and others will be able to see the cord and avoid an accident. Homeowners must assume responsibility for any accidents involving such extension cords.

"Mow less, spray less, plant more natives."

<u>2024 Fall No Blow Proposal Approved by the Maintenance Committee and Board</u> of Directors

Fall Now Blow will help Tamarack support overwintering pollinators and other invertebrates by providing them with winter leaf-cover. No Blow reduces noise, dust, turf and bed damage and pollution from gas-powered leaf blowers.

For the past two Fall leaf cleanups, NGT has assisted residents who wanted the leaves left on their flower beds by delineating these areas with **WHITE flags**. These flags must be placed on the outside edges of all developed or mulched beds in your yard; you can no longer choose which beds. The white flags indicate to the contractor NOT TO BLOW out the leaves in those designated areas.
