The James V. Burkhard Award



Board and Committee Business

Volunteers Needed for New Green Energy Ad Hoc Committee

At the TT Board meeting on January 28, the Board voted to create a new Energy Conservation and Green Energy Ad Hoc Committee, whose task will be to help the Association implement the green energy policy adopted by the Board last year. That energy policy, in summary, provides that, as the Association replaces old equipment or acquires new equipment, it will consider, and when feasible, purchase non-fossil fuel-burning and high-efficiency equipment and otherwise seek energy efficiency throughout its operations. The new Ad Hoc Committee will facilitate implementation of this policy by investigating and compiling information about green energy alternatives and energy conversation measures so that the Association can draw on that information when making decisions about purchasing new or replacement equipment or taking other energy conserving measures. The Ad Hoc Committee will not make decisions about purchases themselves, but will serve as a resource to assist staff, the Board, and the relevant standing committees as they make these decisions. The Board hopes the Ad Hoc Committee will also serve as a resource for individual residents who want to consider energy efficiency and renewable energy options for their own homes.

The full motion approved by the Board creating this new Ad Hoc Committee provides as follows:

Motion: to create an Energy Conservation and Green Energy Ad Hoc Committee that will report directly to the Board of Directors for one year after which time the Board, with input from the community, will determine if the Ad Hoc Committee continues as it is, be permanently attached to a standing committee or dissolve.

Purpose:

To facilitate implementation of the Association's new Energy Policy the Ad hoc Committee in conjunction with the Association Manager, will work with staff, the Maintenance Committee, the Finance Committee, and the Amenities Committee (the "standing committees") to review the inventory of all of the Association's energy-consuming equipment that has been prepared by staff, and to help staff update that inventory if needed. The Ad Hoc Committee shall work with and assist staff to research energy efficient and non-fossil-fuel alternative equipment, along with other energy conservation and efficiency steps the Association can consider and shall provide the results of this research to staff, the standing committees, and the Board of Directors, to facilitate their future decision-making consistent with the goals of the Association's Energy Policy.

An invitation shall also be sent out via Good Life for all other Community members who are interested in serving on this Ad Hoc Committee asking them to let Stacey Haberman and Keith Findley know of their interest.

Neighbors for a Greener Tamarack Fall Activities and Updates

"Mow less, spray less, plant more natives."

Think Spring! - Ideas from Neighbors for a Green Tamarack Work Group

Its going to be Spring soon! It will soon be time to think about adding to your garden. Consider native plants. They take less water, once established they require no watering, and offer food to pollinators like butterflies and other insects. There are many resources on where to obtain native plants. These days most garden stores have a collection with good instruction. Check out a resource page that will shortly be posted on our NGT bulletin board. This board is behind the entrance door to the office. We will be highlighting a native plant each month that could work well in your garden.

Looking ahead, NGT is gearing up for the No Mow/Low Mow May season. This effort identifies areas in Tamarack that will be mowed once or twice during May to allow plants to blossom and provide nectar and food early in the Spring for pollinators like bees when food is not abundant yet. As May progresses, take a walk and observe how much life can occur in these spots where plants are allowed to grow for a bit.

Volunteer! NGT is always looking for new members. If you enjoy helping make Tamarack a more abundant place for wildlife and reducing pesticide exposure through one our initiatives, please consider joining the group. We meet once a month on Tuesday afternoons for about 2 hours. We coordinate No Spray, No Blow, and No Mow/Low Mow initiatives and host the occasional work group. Feel free to contact any of the members or come to a meeting!

KNOW YOUR TAMARACK NEIGHBOR - James Steinbach

This month I have had the pleasure of interviewing & writing up Tamarack's former President of our Community Services Association Board of Directors, James Steinbach. What a varied, interesting life James has led both because of outside influences & because of his own choices.

James was born in Minneapolis & spent four years there before accompanying his three siblings (two brothers & one sister), & his parents (Burr & Susie Steinbach) to England where his father, a research scientist, did his work. James attended early school (Crouch End School) in England & it must have been a bit rigorous for later he remarked about American schools that "All they did was play & nap!!"

The family came back to America (Chicago) where James attended the lab school for the University for 1-12 grades. In high school, he ran indoor & outdoor track, was president of the Student Council, & "got decent grades." Then, after graduation from H.S., James took one year off & worked on an oceanographic ship.

After his year off, a very good English curriculum attracted James to Pomona College near L.A. This was around the time of the Kent State problems so after one year, he decided he didn't want to be in California when the U.S. was in turmoil, so he transferred to Antioch College in Baltimore where he discovered videotaping, & particularly the joys of working with older people.

He graduated from Antioch and spent a couple of years working in New York, and then a year of vacationing in Hawaii. After that, he put his nose to the grindstone & worked for years in St. Paul at the PBS station. In 1990, he came to PBS in Madison, and here he has stayed & retired as Director.

Along the way, he served on various advisory committees, including the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, PBS, the National Science Foundation, the National Endowment for the Humanities, & others. His work has received multiple honors, including Emmy awards, the AAAS Science Journalism Award, the duPont-Columbia University Journalism Award, and awards from The National Commission on Working Women, Action for Children's Television, and others.

James married in 1984 and had two children (Jessica, 39 of Calgary, Canada; & Rebecca, 35 of Portland, Oregon) They were divorced, and in 2005, James married Christina. She has two children (Nicole 40 of Madrid, Spain; & Beau, 35 of San Diego, CA). James commented that he & Christina have varied places to visit with their children so spread out!!

Now that he is retired, Habitat for Humanity, is the beneficiary of his skills on Tuesday & Thursday afternoons. He is a member of the Board of Directors for the Humane Society and a volunteer at PBS Wisconsin. He also finds time to read, & care for the family brown dog, Moki.

Let's hope that James & Christina chose to live in Tamarack for many years to come.
